RECYCLING ROUNDUP

While my recycling emphasis is almost always on the variety of items that residents can recycle in the apartment buildings' recycling/trash rooms and cottages, this month's recycling emphasis will be on one type only: paper. Just what kind of paper qualifies to be recycled in The Village?

Newspapers Magazines Office Paper Printed Copy Paper

Mail – First Class, Third Class, Bulk Rate. Stationery, including envelopes with or without a postage stamp and with or without a window. Brochures, advertising cards and booklets. Egg cartons, most frequently they are a dull grey color. (No Styrofoam egg cartons.) Manila folders. Scratch paper/pads, including backing. Paper bags. Many food product packages, as long as they do not have any food residue on them, and various product packages. Paper forms. Shredded paper in a clear plastic bag. Greeting cards and wrapping paper.

Last but not least: Post-It notes. I think this list contains 99% of the paper recyclables. However, if you know what's in the last one percent, drop me line.
